PROPOSED LICENCE AND CONDITIONS

Litchfield Café is a family-owned and operated establishment dedicated to providing a welcoming and enjoyable experience for both visitors and locals. The café offers a diverse menu, including the popular "Coffee Club" selection, along with an extensive range of beverages. Guests can choose from light, medium, and full-strength beers, ready-todrink (RTD) options, wines, and a variety of non-alcoholic drinks. Conveniently located near Litchfield National Park, the café caters to residents within local area as well as interstate and international tourists exploring the region.

Objections to the application:

An objection may only be made on the following grounds:

- a) that issuing the licence or authority, varying the conditions, substituting other premises or making the material alteration would adversely affect:
 - i) the amenity of the neighbourhood of the licensed premises or proposed licensed premises; or
 - ii) the health, education, public safety or social conditions in the community of the licensed premises or proposed licensed premises;
- b) that the applicant is not a fit and proper person.

Only the following may make an objection:

- a) a person residing or working in the neighbourhood of the licensed premises or proposed licensed premises;
- b) the owner or occupier of land in the neighbourhood of the licensed premises or proposed licensed premises;
- c) a local council of the local government area where the licensed premises or proposed licensed premises are located;
- d) a Member of the Legislative Assembly;
- e) a police officer or employee of the Police Force, acting in that capacity;
- f) a member or employee of the Northern Territory Fire and Rescue Service, established under the Fire and Emergency Act 1996, acting in that capacity;
- g) an Agency or public authority that performs functions relating to public amenities, including health, education and public safety;

h) a charity or a community-based organisation or body.

The objection must be lodged with the Director of Liquor Licensing (the Director) within 14 days of the publication of the notice and:

- a) be in writing or in a form approved by the Director that is suitable for someone unable to effectively communicate in writing; and
- b) be signed by or on behalf of the person or body making the objection; and
- c) set out the grounds of the objection and the facts relied on to support those grounds.

Applicant's right to respond to objection:

Objections are to be lodged with the Director by email at <u>DirectorLiquorLicensing@nt.gov.au</u>.

The Director must provide the applicant with any objections lodged and notice of their right to respond to the objection.

The *Liquor Act 2019* requires a notice to be published of the application along with a detailed description of the business proposed to be conducted, how to obtain a copy of the Community Impact Assessment and how to lodge an objection to the liquor licence. The number of vehicles increases with visitation to Litchfield National Park increasing from late May, peaking in August and decreasing as humidity levels rise towards onset of the Wet Season. Patronage will be drawn from traffic already passing by our front entry following the pattern of increase and decrease. We have been observing the traffic flow over the three years since the Litchfield Park Road loop was fully sealed from the Park's Northern entry to the Cox Peninsula Road. We have found that the majority of the traffic passes our, and Woolaning Primary School entries from approximately 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and again between 3:30 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. These entries are 200 metres apart with a good line of sight and have speed and School Zone warning signs posted.

Action

There will be no entertainment on a regular basis. Cultural events may be hosted from time to time. Local Artists may wish to promote themselves with a live performance. A local Indigenous person has expressed an interest in this for tour groups.

Noise prevention action/s

The largest audience for local Artists is during the lunch period from 12:00 to 2:00 p.m. As lunch time music is generally considerably lower in volume there should not be any issues.

If the local Artist performs at night during the dinner service the performer would be required to not play loudly. We need to take into consideration that our staff live closer than any local community members. The Artist would be set up in a place that is sheltered by buildings.

Prior to a Special Event Authority being applied for e.g. Festival, the local community will be consulted with in regards to the dates and timings of any sounds/music that may have an adverse effect on the local community.

Section 1924 is a large property and has several areas that resemble a 'sound shell'. The area that may be used is over 500 metres from the Woolaning Primary School residence and over 1000 metres from Hideaway Litchfield Cabins. Noise will be abated by substantial bushland, being sheltered behind higher ground and facing West, away from the residences.

The school and residence electricity is sourced from an unsilenced diesel generator that operates 24/7. The level of noise from this machine masks most other sounds.
